OPPORTUNITY FOR RESIDENTS TO ADDRESS THE COUNCIL ON AGENDA ITEMS

Susan Kniep, 44-46 and 50 Olde Roberts Street, (1) distributed to the Chair information off the judicial website regarding the East Hartford Housing Authority's tax appeal of King Court; (2) suggested that the Council include an update from the East Hartford Housing Authority at the next Town Council meeting; and (3) mentioned that the Hartford Courant has an FOI complaint against the East Hartford Housing Authority.

Mayor Leclerc addressed the Council on the following: (1) she will be in attendance at the celebratory Mass at St. Isaac Jogues' on Sunday, October 26th; (2) looks forward to the update on the progress of the Raymond Library; (3) announced that the Library and ChildPlan were awarded a \$25,000 grant to present "Mother Goose on the Loose", a preschool program for literacy improvement; (4) the Electric Run, recently held at Rentschler Field, emitted amplified sound beyond the ordinance limits - a meeting with Global Spectrum was called and it was emphasized that the town's Code of Ordinances must be strictly followed; (5) the soccer event held on October 10th at Rentschler Field produced significant traffic delay into neighborhood streets - Global Spectrum was notified that this situation cannot happen again; (6) on October 8th, the I.T. department of the Bank of America volunteered to clean headstones at Veterans' Field – it was the 3rd year that Bank of America employees have volunteered for this; (7) the last Farmers' Market will be held Friday, October 24th; (8) the Police and Fire Departments, along with the town's Health Department and the East Hartford Public School system, have worked together to ready the 911 operators with standardized questions regarding any health issues in light of the nation's recent Ebola problem; (9) the last senior flu clinic will be held on Friday. October 24th from 1PM to 4PM at the south end Senior Center; (10) the auditors are in the middle of the town's annual audit, which should be ready for presentation mid-December: (11) the Board of Education is preparing their 2015-2016FY budget; (12) the town is preparing their 2015-2016 budget, which will be presented to the Town Council by February 23rd, pursuant to the Town Charter.

Responses to Questions Asked of Administration

Savings from the use of Solar Panels

The town has two solar sites. One of the two town sites is at the Public Safety Complex, the smallest installation for the town, therefore the savings are slight, roughly \$500 per month. The other site is the East Hartford Community Cultural Center with savings of about \$1500 per month. Over 20 years, the estimated savings based on current costs is \$480,000.

Update on the Raymond Library Expansion Project

Mary Martin, Project Administrator, and Susan Hansen, Library Director, updated the Council as to the progress of the Raymond Library expansion. So far, the project is within budget and major construction will be completed by late January, which is about a month earlier than expected. The move-in process could take another six to eight weeks, bringing the formal opening to late March. Through a short PowerPoint presentation, the Council saw the construction progression over the past several months, as well as a sampling of the furniture that will be purchased for the various new rooms within the expanded structure.

Maintenance of Town Buses

The town buses receive regularly scheduled maintenance and our drivers follow appropriate protocols. Occasionally, there are issues with a vehicle that surface and they are addressed proactively. The buses are in very good shape; our drivers perform vehicle checks daily. The maintenance of the senior buses is performed by our vendor Tolland Auto Body. This arrangement was made several years ago since they have the ability to service all aspects of the vehicle including the lifts and they are certified for repairs related to the DMV bus inspections. The certified DMV inspectors provide the annual inspection. As with all Town vehicles, the driver is responsible to report any suspected deficiencies with the vehicle to the Fleet garage, i.e. engine light, squeaky brakes, headlights, wiper blades, worn treads, etc. These items are typical pre-trip and walk-around items that each driver is required to perform.

Collection Rate of Taxes Collected

The tax collection rate is calculated one time during the year and it's calculated by the auditors as part of their examination and annual report. They need to take both the July and January collections, the 60 day post June 30th collections and adjust for the current and the prior advance collections, movements to suspense, and factor in an allowance for uncollectible.

The 2013 Fiscal Year collection rate is published in the audit which is online. The 2014 Fiscal Year rate as described above will be available when the audit is received in draft, sometime the first week of December. Overall, calculation of the collection rate is a bit of a process and just a single part of the larger reconciliation of the Town's rate book.

East Hartford Housing Authority: CCTV at Miller Gardens

<u>Deb Bouchard</u>, Executive Director of the EHHA, reported via email that "after several attempts to get Comcast out to the Miller Gardens property to address the CCTV problem, we were finally successful. They...replaced the modulator that we had been complaining about. Once it was replaced, the lobby cameras were back online."

<u>Majority Leader Barbara Rossi</u>, who initiated the report to the EHHA on this security issue, thanked those involved for making the residents of Miller Gardens feel safe in their homes.

Pursuant to our discussion on July 28, 2014, I am requesting that the lease information listed below be placed on the August 18, 2014 agenda of the Town Council as a referral to the Subcommittee on Fees. These are four non-profit organizations which are leasing space from the Town of East Hartford.

Separate actions may be taken by the Council to determine their fees. The recommendations described below are independent of each other.

A. The "East of the River Action for Substance-Abuse Elimination" (ERASE) program has leased 1,343.5 square feet at the former McCartin School since April 1996. Space is used as offices for 6 to 8 staff members. Their current three-year lease is due to expire on August 17, 2014. The tenant has been paying \$3.59 per square foot (\$4,823.17 annually) for the present year. They also reimburse the Town for a portion of the cost of utilities based on the amount of leased space.

We are proposing a three-year agreement with an increase of twenty cents per square foot per year. The Town will continue to be reimbursed for utilities.

They also reimburse the Town for a portion of the cost of utilities based on the amount of leased space.

We are proposing a three-year agreement with an increase of twenty cents per square foot per year. The Town will continue to be reimbursed for utilities.

C. The local non-profit organization, Friends of Center Cemetery, Inc., has used 763 square feet at the former McCartin School as storage, office, and meeting space for their Board of Directors since 1996. They have been leased the space for \$1 (one dollar) per year and are not assessed a charge for utility consumption.

In recognition of their volunteer advocacy efforts for our historic Center Cemetery, we are proposing that our agreement with the Friends remain the same for a three-year lease period.

Please note that each of the above leases contain language providing the Town, as Landlord, with the option to treat each tenant as a month-to-month lessee in the event that a new written lease is not executed before the expiration date of the previous lease. Such status is subject to all the terms and conditions of the expired lease.

D. St. Isaac Jogues Church has leased a parcel of land (0.6488 acres) on the corner of Community Street and Home Terrace as a paved parking lot from the Town of East Hartford since 1967. The fee for this use has been \$1 (one dollar) per year and expires on expires August 31, 2014. The Church maintains the lot and provides the Town with insurance protection.

We are proposing that this arrangement remain in effect for the next three years at the same terms and conditions as noted above.

I. Funding Opportunity Description

A. Program Summary

The FY 2014 HSGP is comprised of three interconnected grant programs:



• State Homeland Security Program (SHSP): SHSP supports the implementation of risk driven, capabilities-based State Homeland Security Strategies to address capability targets set in Urban Area, State, and regional Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessments (THIRAs). The capability targets are established during the THIRA process, and assessed in the State Preparedness Report (SPR) and inform planning, organization, equipment, training, and exercise needs to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism and other catastrophic events.



- Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI): The UASI program addresses the unique risk driven and capabilities-based planning, organization, equipment, training, exercise needs, of high-threat, high-density Urban Areas based on the capability targets identified during the THIRA process and associated assessment efforts, and assists them in building an enhanced and sustainable capacity to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism.
- Operation Stonegarden (OPSG): OPSG supports enhanced cooperation and coordination among local, Tribal, territorial, State, and Federal law enforcement agencies in a joint mission to secure the United States' borders along routes of ingress from international borders to include travel corridors in States bordering Mexico and Canada, as well as States and territories with international water borders.

All three programs are founded on risk-driven, capabilities-based strategic plans. These strategic plans outline capability requirements and inform how available funding may be applied to manage risk. For these plans to be effective, government officials and elected leaders, working with the whole community, must consider how to sustain current capability levels and address potential gaps to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism and other disasters.

B. Program Priorities

The National Preparedness System is the instrument the Nation employs to build, sustain, and deliver core capabilities in order to achieve the National Preparedness Goal (the Goal) of a secure and resilient Nation. Complex and far-reaching threats and hazards require a collaborative and whole community approach to national preparedness that engages individuals, families, communities, private and nonprofit sectors, faith-based organizations, and all levels of government. The guidance, programs, processes, and systems that support each component of the National Preparedness System allows for the integration of preparedness efforts that build, sustain, and deliver core capabilities and achieve the desired outcomes identified in the Goal. The purpose of the HSGP is to prevent terrorism and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the

greatest risk to the security of the United States; therefore, HSGP funded investments must have a terrorism-nexus.

To evaluate National progress in building, sustaining, and delivering the core capabilities outlined in the Goal, FEMA annually publishes the National Preparedness Report (NPR). Looking across all 31 core capabilities outlined in the Goal, the NPR provides a National perspective on critical preparedness trends for whole community partners to use to inform program priorities, allocate resources, and communicate with stakeholders about issues of shared concern.

Grantees are expected to consider National areas for improvement identified in the 2013 National Preparedness Report, which include cybersecurity, recovery-focused core capabilities, the integration of individuals with access and functional needs, enhancing the resilience of infrastructure systems, and maturing the role of public-private partnerships. Addressing these areas for improvement will enhance preparedness Nationwide.

In addition, the Department of Homeland Security expects grantees to prioritize grant funding to address gaps identified through the annual SPR in achieving capability targets set through the annual THIRA. These assessments identify the jurisdictions' capability targets and current ability to meet those targets. Grantees should prioritize grant funds to increase capability for high-priority core capabilities with low capability levels.

Minimum funding amounts are not prescribed by the Department for these priorities; however, grantees are expected to support state, local, regional, and National efforts in achieving the desired outcomes of these priorities.

Appendix B also includes other areas where funding can be applied to strengthen preparedness efforts.


