CALL TO ORDER

Chair Kehoe called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The Chair noted that several of the Councillors were not in attendance due to illness and wished them all a speedy recovery. He then announced the exit locations in accordance with Connecticut General Statutes §29-381, after which the Council joined him in the pledge of allegiance.

OPPORTUNITY FOR RESIDENTS TO ADDRESS THE COUNCIL ON AGENDA ITEMS

<u>Susan Kniep</u>, 50 Olde Roberts Street, (1) asked what financial impact the transfer of money to the OPEB trust fund would have on East Hartford taxpayers; (2) suggested that the Town Council, with the Mayor, form a committee to determine what the town's assets are; and (3) believes there should be an audit of the East Hartford Community Cultural Center.

Mayor Leclerc (1) announced that Fire Chief John Oates will be inducted into the State of Connecticut's Firefighter's Association Hall of Fame on April 4th; (2) January's Lunch with the Mayor has been cancelled due to a scheduling conflict; (3) the marriage license fee charged by the Town Clerk's office will be waived on February 14th; (4) the EHPD will host "Coffee with a Cop" on Thursday February 14th at Dunkin Donuts on Ellington Road from 8AM to 10AM; and (5) commented on the memo from MIRA regarding tipping fees that is included under "Communications" on tonight's agenda.

COMMUNICATIONS AND PETITIONS

Materials Innovation & Recycling Authority (MIRA): Possible Tip Fee Increase

<u>Chair Kehoe</u> stated that a letter from the Materials Innovation and Recycling Authority (MIRA) indicated a serious mechanical failure with the trash-to-energy facility in Hartford's South Meadows in November 2018. While the repairs were underway, the costs to divert the waste processing averaged over \$100/ton. If this increase continues, it will be necessary to incorporate it into the tip fee for FY2020.

Chair Kehoe said that this situation serves to emphasize the importance for all residents to recycle.

OPEB Contribution for FY2018 re: §10-52 of the East Hartford Code of Ordinances

Chair Kehoe explained the Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) ordinance, adopted in June 2008, serves to address the long-term liabilities of the town by setting aside the excess in the town's Fund Balance that is over 10% of the current fiscal year's budget. This year that amount is \$1,587,900 which will be transferred to the OPEB Trust Fund.

The Chair went on to say that the town's funds are well managed – an opinion that is shared by Standard & Poor's, referencing their October 2018 report that states "East Hartford's budgetary performance is strong, in our opinion. East Hartford's budgetary flexibility is strong. East Hartford's liquidity is strong, very strong. East Hartford's debt and contingent liability profile is strong".

NEW BUSINESS

State Bond Commission Grant re: Athletic Fields at East Hartford High School and East Hartford Middle School

Leclerc, Mayor of the Town of East Hartford, is authorized to make application to, and execute and approve on behalf of this corporation, any and all documents, contracts, and amendments as may be required by the state Department of Energy and Environmental Protection as they pertain to this Personal Services Agreement.
